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# District enrollment down almost 600 students

Enrollment is down by almost 600 students in the Fairbanks North Star Borough School District this year compared to last as recorded according to a preliminary tally from the district's count period.

enrollment over the past year and marks a 23% decline over the past 20

The count period determines the funding the district receives from the state, a majority share of their overall budget.

possible reasons for the decline.

Ott said 2,533 students left the district between last year and this current year, 29.8% of that number graduated and 15.1% transferred to a homeschool/correspondence program out of the district. The biggest contributing factor is 1,029 students, or 58%, that moved out of the state of Alaska with their fami-

Other factors were moves within the state, unaccounted for drop

outs and transfers to private schools in the borough.

The district gained 1,944 students in the same time period, mostly entering the district though pre-school and

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

## **Ted Stevens** In'l Airport to be impacted by flight reductions

Ted Stevens International Airport in Anchorage, which is among the 40 busiest hubs in the U.S., will start cutting flights starting Friday due to the ongoing federal government shutdown.

The Federal Aviation Administration announced Wednesday that it would reduce air traffic by 10% in high-volume markets to maintain travel safety. The FAA stated that air traffic controllers are showing signs of strain as they go unpaid during the government shutdown.

Among the other 40 airports are Seattle, Los Angeles, Denver, Atlanta, Dallas, San Francisco and multiple airports in Chicago, New York and Hous-

Industry analysts say the 10% reduction could affect 1,800 flights and impact as many as 260,000 passengers a day.

Teri Lindseth, the Alaska International Airport System development manager, issued a statement that Ted Stevens will remain fully operational.

"All safety and security functions continue without interruption," Lindseth said, adding the airport continues to work closely with its federal partners and airlines to minimize impacts to passengers and cargo operations."

U.S. Transportation Secretary Sean Duffy told reporters on Wednesday that more flight cancellations will likely occur the longer the government shutdown continues. He added USDOT and the FAA are
