Schools chief outlines 100-day plan

The Montgomery school board met for its monthly meeting July 8. The members reviewed policy changes, and Superintendent Zickeyous Byrd outlined his 100-day plan.

Byrd said he will continue tours of the district's schools when they are back in session. The first day of classes in Montgomery Public Schools is set for Aug. 5.

He also plans to hold town hall meetings in each board member's district.

He is adding and repurposing several administrative positions.

Byrd said he also plans to recruit experienced teachers to mentor newer teachers.

Byrd said his staff is researching ways to monetarily support employee incentive programs. Byrd announced that the district received \$400,000 in federal moneys for special education improvements. Of this money, half will go to Dalraida Elementary School and the other half will go to Vaughn Road Elementary School.

The district is the only in the state to receive money for two schools.

"This exceptional accomplishment, it reflects the strength and the quality of our proposal and the vision for an inclusive environment," Bryd said.

Chief Academic Officer Gregory King

said the district created the literacy target action plan. The goal is to improve reading test scores for grades K-3.

Much of the plan focuses on supporting teachers and encouraging principals to guide them in instruction. The hope is to counter low test scores.

City aims to boost river access

Montgomery residents asked to take survey

Advocates for river access are surveying Montgomerians to determine what kind of access they would like to the Alabama River.

The Alabama Rivers Alliance, a statewide network dedicated to protecting waterways, established the Friends of the Alabama River to em power Montgomery residents to advocate for the health of the Alabama River and promote access to it, said Cindy Lowry, the executive director of the Alabama Rivers Alliance. The Montgomery City Council is also paying for a river region community engagement fellow with the organization. "We have this wonderful river. ... Other cities are figuring out how to get people engaged with their water and to use it as an asset both for outdoor recreation quality of life, and birding, and paddling, and all these other things," Montgomery City Councilman Andrew Szymanski said. "And then you go to our river, and it's fairly unused. "So, kind of the goal from my side was to figure out ways that we can unlock the river's potential as a key component as our city." The survey marks the first step into this foray. The city and the organization will use the survey's results to determine plans for future development along the river.
