Garland County Library patrons will be able to see more benefits in September as the library is joining with several other libraries across central Arkansas for the Power of the Card program.

Each September, libraries across the country encourage people to sign up for a library card, and the Garland County Library started its own push in 2022 called Show Us Your

County Library, she actually and joining Power of the cause last year, your Garland started their version of Na-Card. Central Arkansas and County card only worked in tional Library Card Sign-up Month," Jessamyn Carter, the public relations coordinator for the Garland County Library, said. "It's called Power of the Card. They started that back in either 2018 or 2019. We actually noticed that they were doing that, which is when we started in 2022."

This year, Lapp reached out to all of the libraries in central Arkansas, asking if they would be interested in expanding their programs

Habitual offender gets 12-year term

A reportedly homeless man arrested in January for two home invasions and several thefts was sentenced to 12 years in prison Wednesday after pleading guilty to multiple charges in

Garland County Circuit Court. Philip Tad Ogden, 59, who has remained in custody since his arrest and who listed "city streets" as his address at the time, pleaded guilty to two counts of residential burglary, reduced from

original charges of aggravated residential burglary, and was sentenced to the maximum of 20 years in prison, with

eight years of it suspended, on each count, to run concurrently.

Ogden also pleaded guilty to three felony counts of theft of property and was sentenced to the maximum of six years in prison on each count, to run concurrently with each other and with the burglary sentences. He was also ordered to pay a total of \$2,050 in restitution in the form of a civil judgment to the victims and \$380 in court costs and fees.

Ogden was sentenced as an habitual offender in the cases. According to court records, he was convicted of two felony counts of robbery in August 2015 and was sentenced to 10 years in prison, with three years suspended, and had prior misdemeanor convictions for theft of property which upgraded the new theft charges to felonies.

According to the probable cause affidavit, on Jan. 1, around 2:30 p.m., a local man reported hearing someone in the driveway of his residence on Fox Run Circle and saw a red Ford Ranger pickup truck leaving his driveway. He then discovered his power washer miss-
