Police: No evidence of gunshots on AR campus

Fayetteville Police issued an "all-clear" designation at roughly 2:45 p.m. on the University of Arkansas campus after responding to active shooter reports on campus earlier in the afternoon.

RazALERT sent a text message to students and faculty members around 12:30 p.m. saying that an active shooter was in the area of the Mullins Library. Local, regional and national law enforcement officers responded in assisting University of Arkansas police.

According to a spokesperson with the Fayetteville Police Department, there was zero evidence of any gunshots. There were no victims, and police responded to multiple reports on Monday.

Police were still on campus after the all-clear helping disseminate information and potentially notify students who were still sheltering. As of 3 p.m., Mullins Library was the only building

Over the river at last

I-49 bridge construction finally underway

It's been more than 30 years in the making, and some thought it would never happen.

While it's still another three years from being completed, area residents and visiting dignitaries got a glimpse of the work that has already begun... the newest bridge across the Arkansas River. Once Interstate 49 is finished, drivers could travel from Kansas City to New Orleans on one interstate.

The bridge will connect the portion of I-49 that runs between Highway 22 and 71. When completed by 2029, it will

be 14 miles of highway from Alma to the west of Greenwood. To put it into some perspective, currently it takes about 40 minutes to go from Greenwood High School to Alma High School. When the new I-49 portion is completed, it will take about half of that time.
