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Maj. Gen. Jack Ryan, AR's former Adjutant General, dies at 95

Maj. Gen. James A. "Jack" Ryan, United States Army National Guard (Retired), who led the Arkansas National Guard through the final years of the Cold War and into the early 1990s, died Nov. 25 at the age of 95.

Ryan served as the Adjutant General of Arkansas from 1986 to 1993, overseeing the administration, training and operations of more than 11,000 service members — approximately 9,200 Army National Guard Soldiers and 2,100 Air National Guard Airmen. Appointed by then-Gov. Bill Clinton, Ryan became the state's senior military leader for both branches of the Guard during a period of modernization and increased national defense readiness.

Born Dec. 4, 1929, in Gurdon, Ryan graduated from Arkadelphia High School in 1947 and later earned a Bachelor of Science degree in political science from the University of Arkansas at Little Rock. His military education included

the U.S. Army War College and Harvard University's Executive Program in National and International Security.

He began his military career in 1948 as an enlisted soldier in the Arkansas Army National Guard. He was commissioned as a second lieutenant May 9, 1952, and assigned as a platoon leader with the 153rd Infantry Regiment.

In the next several decades, Ryan held a wide range of leadership roles — aviation officer, assistant communications

oday's teachers find themselves thrust into a difficult position with generative AI.
