The city of Prescott and the Prescott Regional Airport have announced Prescott AirFest 2025 will take place from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 4 at Ernest A. Love Field.

Entry can be found at 6110 Wilkinson Drive in Prescott. This is the first ever Prescott AirFest to take place and it is planned to be an annual event going forward.

The event is free and family-friendly, inviting the community to celebrate aviation and explore one of Northern Arizona's core transportation hubs.

Visitors can expect a day full of activities, including a variety of aircraft and planes on static display for up-close viewing. There will also be a variety of military equipment displays, and service members to meet on-site.

Acorn Montessori School breaks ground on new middle school building

Prescott Valley's Acorn Montessori Charter School broke ground on its new middle school building on Monday, Sept. 8.

Established in 2001, Acorn Montessori originally started as a pre-K and Kindergarten school; now it serves students from Kindergarten through eighth grade as a free charter school. They blend traditional public school with the most efficient Montessori models, Principal Kendra Healey said.

Located at 8556 E. Loos Drive, the building will provide in outdoor learning activities. the school with additional midwhere students can participate for 20 more middle school stu-

The new building will be 10 years. The school has more land that it could expand with in the future, once they have the financial means.

Founder and director, Cynthia Johnson, said the cost of the building will total \$800,000, which includes furnishing classrooms. She said the school is paying cash for the new construction.

"The Acorn schools are excited to expand their student capacity," Johnson said. "Acorn has a tremendous fifth eighth-grade sports program."

Healey said the expansion will help them continue to focus on developing the whole child and make sure they are socially and emotionally well-adjusted as they grow from child to adult.
