Local beaches on track to add sand

Redondo Beach, Manhattan Beach part of plan to replenish eroding shorelines

A new program to replenish beach sand at five local shorefrom the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors — and is Coastal Commission.

Several agencies will have to review and approve the plan before work can begin.


But the hope is that the commission will consider the lines recently received approval overall plan before the end of the year, said Nicole Mooradian, spokesperson for the Los Angeles now headed to the California County Department of Beaches & Harbors.

The targeted beaches are Zuma in Malibu, Will Rogers State in Pacific Palisades, Dockweiler State in Playa del Rey, and Manhattan and Redondo in the South Bay.

The approvals provide permission in advance from the various agencies, Mooradian said, clarifying that "it's a plan, not (yet) a project."

But those approvals will allow

Chase Budinger and Miles Evans will always have a link to the Manhattan Beach pier.

The duo claimed their first AVP Manhattan Beach Open title Sunday afternoon, sweeping both sets from Phil Dalhausser and Trevor Crabb — who have won the event 11 times combined and having their championship plaque mounted on the pier along with all of the other past winners. Top-seeded Kristen Nuss and Taryn Brasher became the first women's team to successfully defended their title on the sand at Manhattan Beach, edging Terese Cannon and Megan Kraft in three sets on Sunday.

The Manhattan Beach Open is regarded as the largest beach volleyball tournament in the U.S., in terms of both size and prestige, and is also the longest-running professional beach volleyball tournament in the country.
