



24,000 nurses OK deal with UC

CNA calls off 2-day strike set to start today after agreeing to tentative 4-year contract

The University of California and the California Nurses Association reached a tentative four-year agreement for nearly 24,000 nurses that includes "meaningful pay and benefit increases" across the university's 19 medical centers and campuses, the two sides announced Sunday.

As part of the terms of the deal, the CNA canceled its two-day systemwide strike planned for today and Tuesday at UC campuses.

UC nurses will vote on the tentative agreement later this week, the CNA said in a statement.

"We're grateful to the nurses and the CNA bargaining team for their partnership and shared

\$10 million program aims to erase debt for wildfire victims

It's the little expenses that add up, like buying new clothes, shoes, pots and pans or paying for Uber rides.

For the 13,000 households without a home in the aftermath of the Pacific Palisades and Eaton fires of Jan. 7, small consumer expenses can't measure up to the cost of rebuilding or ridding homes of ash and smoke. But these are very real costs that act as speed bumps slowing the drive to recovery.

That's where Wescom Financial, a credit union serving 250,000 people in Southern California, comes in. Through its foundation, the Pasadena-based entity has partnered with ForgiveCo
