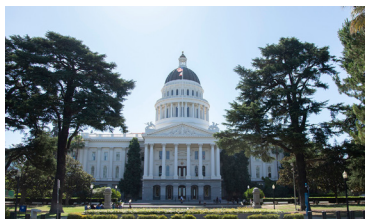

Shannon O'Connor is convicted on 48 charges related to boozy teen house parties where sexual assaults reported

SAN JOSE — A former Los Gatos mother accused of organizing alcohol-fueled teen parties that prosecutors said led to binge drinking and sexual assaults was found guilty Wednesday of 48 crimes encompassing child endangerment and sex offenses.

After a three-month trial, jurors convicted 51-year-old Shannon O'Connor of felonies including two counts of sexual penetration, 13 child endangerment counts and one count of dissuading a witness. The sexual penetration convictions

were the most serious, as prosecutors argued that O'Connor sexually assaulted the two girls by enabling them to become so intoxicated they could not legally consent.

Those convictions will require O'Connor to register as a sex offender. O'Connor faces at least 30 years in prison when she is sentenced, which is expected later this year.

For the two sexual assault counts, prosecutors contend that O'Connor acted more egregiously than simply providing the girls alcohol. One of the boys recounted O'Connor was present and urging him on when he

drunkenly sexually penetrated a girl in a hot tub. The girl testified she was so intoxicated she struggled to keep her head above water during the encounter.

In another instance, a witness said O'Connor appeared unconcerned when a teen girl, identified

Alameda Health dodges layoffs

County votes to form working group to help reduce \$91.7M deficit

A plan to lay off 183 workers and eliminate critical mental health units within the Alameda Health System after cuts to Medicaid threatened vital funding was put on hold Tuesday, bringing relief to those who thought they would lose their jobs in the coming days.

In an effort to mitigate cuts and identify untapped revenue to balance the system's budget, the Alameda County Board of Supervisors unanimously voted to create a working group that will be tasked with helping to reduce an estimated \$91.7 million deficit. The group includes Supervisors Nate Miley and Nikki Fortunato Bas and representatives of the system's administration and health care workers' union.

"AHS was prepared to make the changes that we believe necessary to have sustainability," CEO James Jackson said to the Board of Supervisors on Tuesday. "What we've heard in the intervening time is that the supervisors and the county leadership is prepared to step in with us, and so we're not having to resolve this by ourselves."

The Alameda Health System

Senate thwarts legislation to halt war

Measure is the first to test Trump's powers as Iran conflict escalates

WASHINGTON — Senate Republicans voted down an effort Wednesday to halt President Donald Trump's war against Iran, demonstrating early support for a conflict that has rapidly spread across the Middle East with no clear U.S. exit strategy.

The legislation, known as a war powers resolution, failed on a 47-53 vote tally. The vote fell mostly along party lines, though Republican Sen. Rand Paul of Kentucky voted in favor and Democratic Sen. John Fetterman of Pennsylvania voted against.

The war powers resolution gave lawmakers an opportunity to demand congressional approval before any further attacks are carried out. The vote forced them to take a stand on a war shaping the fate of U.S. military members, countless other lives and the future of the region.

Underscoring the gravity of the

U.S. submarine takes out Iranian warship

Action comes as forces step up bombardment against power symbols

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — A U.S. submarine sank an Iranian warship in the Indian Ocean, as Washington and Israel intensified their bombardment Wednesday of Iran's security forces and other symbols of power. Iran launched more missiles and drones and warned of the destruction of military and economic infrastructure across the Middle East.

The tempo of the strikes on Iran was so intense that state television announced the mourning ceremony for Iranian Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei,

who was killed at the start of the conflict, would be postponed. Millions attended the funeral of his predecessor, Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, in 1989.

The U.S. and Israel launched

the war Saturday, targeting Iran's leadership, missile arsenal and nuclear program while suggesting that toppling the government is a goal. But the exact aims and timelines have repeatedly shifted,

signaling an open-ended conflict.

President Donald Trump praised the U.S. military Wednesday for "doing very well on the war front, to put it mildly." Fellow Republicans in the U.S. Senate stood with Trump on Iran as they voted down a resolution seeking to halt the war.

Israel also traded fire with the Iranian-backed Hezbollah militant group in Lebanon, while Iran fired on Bahrain, Kuwait and Israel. As the conflict spiraled, Turkey said NATO defenses intercepted a ballistic missile launched from Iran before it entered Turkey's airspace.

The war has killed more than 1,000 people in Iran, more than 70 in Lebanon and around a dozen in Israel, according to officials in those countries. It has disrupted the supply of the world's oil and

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
