Flora, wildlife returning to county park, thanks to environment, volunteers

Nature and humans have been working hand-in-hand seven months after the Eaton Canyon Natural Area Park in Pasadena was badly damaged by the Eaton fire.

While human influence is happening at a deliberate pace, nature's rehabilitation team is moving at lightning speed.

The goal is to make the two forces - human power and Mother Nature work in unison, bringing trails back to hike-able condition, rehabilitating the flora and welcoming both wildlife and people back to this 198-acre county park, a popular respite for nature-starved humans.

Wildlife, Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recre-

Europe, Ukraine to meet Trump

Leaders say they want to show support and united front in Oval Office conference today

KYIV, Ukraine — European and NATO leaders announced Sunday they will join President Volodymyr Zelenskyy in Washington to present a united front in talks with President Donald Trump on ending Russia's war in Ukraine and firming up U.S. security guarantees now on the negotiating table.

Leaders from Britain, France, Germany, Italy and Finland are rallying around the Ukrainian president after his exclusion from Trump's summit on Friday with Russian President Vladimir Putin. Their pledge to be at Zelenskyy's side at the White House today is an apparent effort to ensure the meeting goes better than the last one in February, when Trump berated

Kaiser, hospitals battle over ER reimbursements

Providence hospitals in California have joined other hospital chains challenging Kaiser Foundation Health Plan Inc. in court over millions of dollars allegedly owed them for emergency treatment of Kaiser members.

Depending on how the legal fight ends, coupled with expected Medicaid losses from the "Big Beautiful Bill" recently passed by Congress, Providence could be forced to shutter or reduce its emergency departments, company officials say.

California offering \$55M in incentives to build EV fast chargers for public use

The California Energy Commission recently launched a \$55 million incentive program to expand the construction of fast chargers for electric vehicles in public and business sites across the

"One of the common concerns from surveys we've done is motorists say, 'Hey, there's not enough chargers close to me for me to consider buying an EV," said John Gartner, senior director of transportation programs at the Center for Sustainable Energy, the San Diego-based nonprofit that administers the initiative. "So this is an important program to help fill the gaps in charging infrastructure and give people who may be new to EVs more confidence that they will be able to find a convenient place to charge nearby."

Called the Fast Charge California Project, the program is part of the California Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Project, the largest EV charging incentive initiative in the country.

The \$55 million project aims to attract proprietors of places such as convenience stores, gas stations, shopping areas, parking lots and other high-traffic destinations to build fastcharging infrastructure.

The projects must be ready to build and have final utility service design and all required permits in hand.
