Uncertainty looming for flu, COVID shots

Medi-Cal users under age 65 likely to face complications in vaccine access

The ongoing drama in Washington over changes to national vaccine policy has many wondering just how difficult and expensive it will be to get flu and coronavirus shots this fall.

While experts say that the situation is still uncertain, the biggest changes are likely to affect healthy adults under age 65 who are covered by Medicaid, called Medi-Cal in California, the federal health coverage of last resort for more than 70 million Americans, around 8 million of whom live in Southern Cali-

Those who are covered by private health insurance plans from their employers or purchased through health insurance exchanges such as Covered California are likely to see significantly fewer impacts, because most carriers have signaled that they their members with COVID- able Care Act of 2010.

GOP tries to block map vote 2nd time

Republicans file petition with state Supreme Court to halt ballot measure on redistricting

California Republicans have asked the state Supreme Court to block a mid-decade congressional redistricting measure from appearing on the Nov. 4 ballot, arguing that the planned special election violates the state constitution and would compromise voter representation.

The latest petition comes just days after an unsuccessful attempt last week to have the California Supreme Court intervene and halt Democrats' attempt to enact new, partisan congressional maps in California for the next three elections.

Filed on Monday, a group of Republican legislators alleged that California legislative leaders violated the state constitution by bypassing a

Trump moves to ban flag burning despite ruling by **Supreme Court**

WASHINGTON - President Donald Trump on Monday signed an executive order requiring the Justice Department to investigate and prosecute people for burning the American flag, an activity that the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled is legitimate political expression protected by the U.S. Constitution.

The order the Republican president signed in the Oval Office acknowledged the court's 5-4 ruling in a case from Texas in 1989, but said there is still room to prosecute flag burning if it "is likely to incite imminent lawless action" or amounts to "fighting words." In that case, the justices ruled 5-4 that the First

Father present at search for baby's body

Investigators check area near 60 Freeway days after arresting missing boy's parents

The father of 7-month-old Emmanuel Haro accompanied investigators on a search for the baby's remains in Moreno Valley on Sunday, authorities said, but a body was not found.

Jake Haro, 32, was with investigators

and cadaver dogs during the search on the westbound shoulder of the 60 Freeway near Gilman Springs Road, said Mara Rodriguez, a spokesperson for the San Bernardino County Sheriff's

The search occurred two days after Jake Haro and the child's mother were arrested on suspicion of murder following the baby's disappearance.

By 6 p.m. Sunday, investigators had

left the area. Rebecca Haro, 41, initially told authorities on Aug. 14 that she was knocked unconscious outside a Big 5 Sporting Goods store in Yucaipa and awoke to find Emmanuel was gone, authorities said.
