Famed primatologist Jane Goodall dies

Conservationist renowned for her field research on chimpanzees and environmental advocacy was 91

Jane Goodall, the conservationist renowned for her groundbreaking chimpanzee field research and globe-spanning environmental advocacy, has died. She was 91.

The Jane Goodall Institute Goodall announced the primatologist's death Wednesday in an Instagram post.

According to the Washington, D.C.-based institute, Goodall died of natural causes while in California on a U.S. speaking tour.

Her discoveries "revolutionized science, and she was a tireless advocate for the protection and restoration of our natural world," it said. While living among chimpanzees


"The Jane Goodall Institute has learned this morning, Wednesday, Oct. 1, 2025, that Dr. Jane Goodall, DBE, U.N. Messenger of Peace, and the founder of the Jane Goodall Institute, has passed away due to natural causes," Erin McCombs from the Jane Goodall Institute told the shocked crowd.

Students, educators and other attendees wept openly as they learned of the news.

Line fire arsonist gets 16 to life term

Blaze set by Norco man charred 44K acres, hurt firefighters, hit 6 homes

Justin Wayne Halstenberg was sentenced to 16 years to life in state prison on Wednesday

for setting the Line fire in Highland in September 2024, a blaze that damaged six structures, injured six firefighters and burned 44,000 acres.

He received six years for setting a fire that was quickly extinguished by a good Samaritan, a term that will be served first, and 10 years to life for setting the Line fire.



"We have an individual who is a serial arsonist," said Deputy District Attorney Justin Crocker, in successfully arguing for the maximum sentence on both charges. "There is no other way to put it. The evidence shows he is an individual dead
