Advocates push California for single-occupancy cells Officials say it's time to rethink shared quarters in prisons

Under former Gov. Jerry Brown and now Gov. Gavin Newsom, rehabilitation and reentry opportunities remain a growing focal point, too. San Quentin prison stands at the forefront of the discussion, with an "earned living" housing unit comprised exclusively of single-person cells and plans to similarly repurpose the vacated death row buildings. A spokesperson for the prison said it is 'working toward" making single-person cells available to all inmates by spring 2026.

A bill advanced in the California Legislature this year that aims to establish singlecell units at more prisons. The measure did not make it to Newsom, but it's expected

to return in 2026. "We want people to have the opportunity to return back to our community, and we want them to do that in the healthiest manner," said San

Lawsuit: Student wrongly benched

Branson athlete not allowed to play after school transfer

The parent of a student in Marin County has sued an organization that regulates high school sports in California, alleging it improperly blocked her from competing.

Bart Schachter said his daughter transferred to the Branson School in Ross after she experienced antisemitic harassment at a private school in San Francisco. The sophomore joined the tennis and track teams over the summer.

Soon after her transfer, a commissioner from the California Interscholastic Federation ruled she was ineligible to compete for half a season on both of her teams, the lawsuit says.

"This case isn't just about one transfer student — it's about thousands of kids in California who might be experiencing severe or pervasive harassment but are afraid to lose their ability to play varsity sports," said Schachter's attorney, Jay Jambeck.

Schachter filed the lawsuit in Marin County Superior Court. A case management conference is set for Monday with Judge Andrew

Netanyahu insists there can be no Palestinian state

TEL AVIV, Israel - Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu vowed Sunday to oppose any attempt to establish a Palestinian state, a day before the U.N. Security Council planned to vote on a U.S.-drafted resolution on Gaza that leaves the door open to Palestinian independence.

Netanyahu has long asserted that creating a Palestinian state would reward Hamas and eventually lead to an even larger Hamas-run state on Israel's borders. But as the U.S. attempts to push forward with its Gaza ceasefire proposal, he faces heavy international pressure to show flexibility.

The Security Council is expected to vote on a U.S. proposal for a U.N. mandate that would establish an international stabilization force in Gaza despite opposition from Russia, China and some Arab countries.

Hamas and Palestinian factions warned Sunday against the U.S. proposal, calling it an attempt to impose an international mandate on Gaza that is biased toward Israel and deprives
