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

Redistricting measure pushed by Democrats winning more than 50% in Riverside and San Bernardino counties

Trump country, it has an odd way of showing it.

A year ago, President Donald Trump became the first GOP White House hopeful in 20 years to win Riverside and San Bernardino counties

The milestone elated local Republicans, who have hopes elections, it would make it of the purplish region turning red as the GOP outpaced Democrats in voter registration across dozens of Inland impeachment proceedings cities since 2020.

The fight over Proposition If the Inland Empire is 50 isn't over. On Thursday, the Trump administration ioined the California Republican Party in suing to block the ballot measure.

Republicans control the White House, Senate and the House. If Democrats win one or both congressional chambers in the 2026 midterm much harder for Trump to pursue his agenda and potentially leave him vulnerable to

Statewide, Proposition 50 passed with 64% of the vote. Though votes are still being counted, it's winning in Riverside and San Bernardino counties with 56% and 57% of the vote, respectively.


Marcia Godwin, a professor of public administration at the University of La Verne, noted that a poll taken the first week ballots went out showed Proposition 50 failing in the Inland Empire.

Big rain puts a damper on SoCal

Flooding, mudslide risks have travelers and rescuers wary, with another storm to come

Heavy rain that drenched most of Southern California on Saturday is expected to continue into today, as a particularly stormy start to the rainy season heightens concerns about potential flooding and mudslides amid evacuation warnings in communities scorched by recent wildfires.

The rain, torrential at times on Saturday, could also lead to washed-out roads, debris flows and damaging winds, making travel difficult or dangerous, forecasters warned.

Caltrans reported downed trees, falling debris and gravel throughout Los Angeles County. Fog and gusty winds were reported on the 5 Freeway from Gorman to Santa Clarita.

The rain caused a minor rockfall and debris flows on a stretch of Topanga Canyon Boulevard between Pacific Coast Highway and Grand View Drive, Caltrans said. The highway remains closed, and will reopen after the storms pass and crews have removed hazards.

"During this time, folks should be prepared for ample traffic incidents, delays and a few road closures," the National Weather Service said. "This

Study: Economy is leaving Latino workers behind
