Longest-ever shutdown is over

Trump signs government funding bill after a record 43-day disruption that halted food aid, limited flights

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump signed a government funding bill Wednesday night, ending a record 43-day shutdown that caused financial stress for federal workers who went without paychecks, stranded scores of travelers at airports and generated long lines at some

food banks.

The shutdown magnified partisan divisions in Washington as Trump took unprecedented unilateral actions — including canceling projects and trying to fire federal workers — to pressure Democrats into relenting on their demands.

The Republican president blamed the situation on Democrats and suggested

Lawmakers from Southern California vote strictly along party lines to end lengthy federal closure

Members of Congress largely voted along party lines on a budget bill Wednesday night to end the longest federal government shutdown in U.S. history.

The vote was 222-209, with Republicans providing near-unanimous support, while all but six Democrats opposed it.

Lawmakers from Los Angeles, Orange,

Riverside and San Bernardino counties, though, strictly voted along party lines. And, after their Wednesday night votes, they were quick to blame the other side of the aisle for the lengthy shutdown.

"Today's vote means vulnerable children, veterans and seniors will receive vital food assistance," said Rep. Young Kim, a Republican representing communities in


Elite sprinter, hurdler McLaughlin-Levrone faces difficult path to compete for 2 golds

The Los Angeles Olympics organizing committee released the competition schedule for the 2028 Games, which could draw worldwide criticism for failing to maximize the exposure and competitive opportunities for arguably the Games' biggest star.

The track and field schedule makes it all but impossible for American sprinter and hurdler Sydney McLaughlin-Levrone, the two-time Olympic 400-meter hurdles champion and reigning world champion in the 400 meters, to attempt an unprecedented sweep of the 400 and 400 hurdles gold medals.

The majority of the competition schedule for the 2028 Los Angeles Olympics was announced Wednesday by its organizing committee, LA28.

The 2028 Games will be the largest in history with 51 sports. The opening ceremony is scheduled for July 14, 2028, with

the closing ceremony set for Day 16, July

30, 2028.

The first medal event will be the triathlon, which will be held in Venice on Day 1, July 15.

However, as is custom, several team
