Toronto stained-glass artist traded corporate job for delicate craft

If Dylan Ford isn't careful, a wrong twist of his hand could shatter nearly a century of Toronto history.

Ford restores stained-glass windows — some more than 100 years old - in homes across the city's west end. After returning to Toronto from a lonely secondment in the

U.S., Ford turned a hobby he learned through YouTube into a business he now calls Sunday Pro-

As buildings are torn down across Toronto, he's joined a small community of stained-glass artists keeping the city's architectural past alive, pane by pane.

"We take our time. We make things beautiful," Ford said.

The 27-year-old grew up in London, Ont., and eventually settled in a tall, red-brick home tucked deep in the High Park neighbourhood. Ford's first sign promoting his business stands on the front

Former Olympian wanted by U.S. on drug trafficking, murder charges

Mexican authorities announced the seizure of dozens of high-end motorcycles, Olympic medals, drugs and ammunition in a series of raids that appear linked to the manhunt for Ryan Wedding, the former Canadian Olympic snowboarder now accused of running a vast international drug operation.

Law enforcement did not name Wedding, 44, but described the target as "a former Olympic athlete who is among the 10 most wanted fugitives by U.S. authorities." Mexican news outlets have identified Wedding as connected to the raids.

In a news release Wednesday, Mexico's Secretariat of Security and Citizen Protection said four homes were searched in Mexico City and the nearby state of Mexico, where officers found methamphetamine, marijuana, 62 high-end motorcycles, two other vehicles, artwork, two Olympic medals, ammunition and various documents.

It is unclear to whom the medals belong, as Wedding placed 24th in men's parallel giant slalom when he represented Canada at the 2002 Winter Olympics. He was added to the U.S. Federal Bureau of Investigation's most wanted fugitives list in March.
