Developers pivot to affordable housing plan

WESTPORT - From the Hamlet at Saugatuck to an affordable housing develop-

ROAN Ventures, the developer behind the proposed Hamlet at Saugatuck plan denied by the Planning and Zoning Commission two weeks ago, has announced it will file an affordable housing proposal under the state's 8-30g stat-

The plan, tabbed "The Alliance for Saugatuck Housing Opportunity," calls for some 500 units, according to a ROAN Ventures release, add-

ing the state statute does not mandate public amenities, walkability and waterfront access as envisioned in The Hamlet proposal. Under the state statute, 30% of the units must be set aside as affordable.

'Off-site improvements may be reconsidered to accommodate the target of delivering between 400 and 500 residential units to the community," the release states.

The commission voted 4-0 with commissioners Neil Cohn, Michael Cammeyer and Bre Injeski abstaining — to deny the massive mixed-use development plan that included a hotel with retail and residential offerings.

"My client is very disappointed with the Commission's denial of The Hamlet, especially after working with the Commission and Town on The Hamlet over a long period of time," said Chris Smith, zoning attorney for ROAN Ven-

"However, my client understands that Westport has been receptive to residential communities with housing opportunity components in the past," Smith added.

According to Smith, ROAN Ventures looks forward to working with town officials to create a comprehensive proposal that "promotes housing

City moves to demo undeveloped Cherry Street Lofts buildings

BRIDGEPORT — The long-delayed next phase of the Cherry Street Lofts housing complex may be permanently canceled by a wrecking ball.

With the city seeking bids from demolition contractors, time is rapidly running out for Gary Flocco to break ground on the redevelopment of the four blighted structures in

"It is a race," Flocco acknowledged this week. "And I understand it. The buildings are in bad shape."

He anticipates closing on the loans needed to finance construction by mid-September, before Mayor Joe Ganim's administration can actually move forward with razing 62, 72 and 80 Cherry St. and 1325 Railroad Ave.

"I've been in touch with the city," Flocco said. "They are willing to work with us.'

Economic Development Director Thomas Gill, in a brief statement for this article, said, "The city's position has been consistent that there will be no change in the demo process unless a formal commitment letter for the financing is received by the city.'

Situated on the outskirts of downtown between the railroad tracks and Interstate 95, Cherry Street Lofts is a prominent renovation of

State leads in kindergarten vaccine rates

With a new school year around the corner, Connecticut's kindergarteners are leading the nation in at least one category: immunization.

The state continues to rank among the top in the country for immunization rates despite a national drop in childhood vaccination, according to new data from the Centers for Disease Control and Preven-

An estimated 98.3% of kindergartners in Connecticut received the measles, mumps and rubella vaccine in the 2024-2025 school year, a 0.5% increase from the previous year. Students are required to have the vaccine in Connecticut, although some exemptions are allowed.
