'They have financial obligations'

'Frustrated' federal employees in Conn. miss first full paychecks, airport workers turn to food bank

Federal employees in Connecticut missed their first full paychecks this week amid a government shutdown that shows no sign of ending.

Though many of Connecticut's more than 7,000 federal employees continue to

be paid during the shutdown due to the way their agencies are funded, others have either been placed on furlough or forced to work without pay. After collecting partial paychecks earlier in the month for a pay period that began before the shutdown, they received \$0 paychecks this week.


Kevin Curtiss, New England regional

vice president for the National Air Traffic Controllers Association, said the union's members, including about 60 in Connecticut, are generally frustrated by the situation and afraid what will happen if they miss further paychecks.

"They have financial obligations and they have families they need to provide for," Curtiss said.

"And without knowing when that paycheck is going to come, you end up feeling frustrated, and there's a little bit of fear for your family and for yourself."

Official warns airport expansion in peril

NEW HAVEN — The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has determined that it has jurisdiction over nearly 15 acres of wetlands that might be affected by the proposed Tweed New Haven Regional Airport expansion project and will need to approve plans before the project can go forward.

Meanwhile, Avports CEO Marc Ricks met Thursday with Greater New Haven business leaders in a meeting hosted by the Greater New Haven Chamber of Commerce and, according to one involved official, Tweed New Haven Airport Authority Chairman Robert Reed, was to have offered a blunt assessment of the situation.

"Key points to be communicated by Mr. Ricks include the critical need for consent from both New Haven and East Haven to advance the project," Reed wrote in a letter sent to authority members. "At this moment, there is no consensus from either municipal leader, and without their agreement, Avports is unable to proceed with the project."

New Haven Mayor Justin Elicker responded Friday that as far as he is concerned, "nothing's changed." and he

Registrar: 'We don't need two weeks'

Low early voting turnout has Connecticut officials questioning 14-day period

While municipal elections routinely see a far lower voter turnout than others

like a presidential year, early voting numbers show even fewer voters than expected, leading some registrars around Connecticut to question whether 14 days of early voting is necessary.

As of Friday, early voting accounts for 15.5% of what the state Secretary of the State's office expects for the overall turn-


