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JSC sets deadline

THE Judicial Services Commission has set a March 31 deadline for the resolution of matters relating to Barbara Malimali's appointment as FICAC commissioner.

JSC secretary and Chief Registrar Tomasi Bainivalu said in a statement that it met yesterday to discuss the High Court ruling that declared Ms Malimali's removal by the President, on the advice of the Prime Minister, unlawful.

In a judgment that has sent shockwaves through Government,

High Court judge Justice Dane Tuigereqere laid bare the extraordinary chain of events that led to the appointment and abrupt removal of Ms Malimali.

In meticulous detail, the court traced how an unresolved complaint against Ms Malimali lay dormant inside FICAC for months, only to be suddenly

revived when she emerged as the successful candidate for the top job. What followed was an unprecedented series of actions — raids, arrests and political intervention culminating in the revocation of her appointment less than nine months later.

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
