Courthouse museum: Where Citrus County's past gets a second life

Steve Hrycaj, chairman of the Inverness Cultural Heritage Council, walked through the museum for the first time after his wife told him he needed something to do besides "not walking anymore." He had retired in 2012.

'So as a joke, I'll come in and take a look," he said.

He met then Museum Director Kathy Turner Thompson, filled out a volunteer form, and was immediately put to work reorganizing the gift shop – first because of his retail background, then because he taught history, English, civics and government.

"And that's what started my love affair with the building," he said.

Hrycaj, who takes on an almost professorial persona in appearance and with his deep knowledge of Citrus County history, now helps coordinate concerts, speaker series, events and partnerships that support the museum financially and bring in new audiences.

"We try ... if she's running short on supplies, we'll underwrite it," he said of assistant program manager Andrea Cuccaro. His group helps
