Texas detention center location alarms critics

Fort Bliss is at site of WWII internment camp

FORT BLISS, TX - Americans of Japanese heritage say they hear echoes of their families' forced internment in the Trump administration's newest immigrant detention site.

Homeland Security officials say President Donald Trump's sweeping

mass deportation campaign requires a build-up of detention centers to bridge the gap between arrests and removals. They've turned to the U.S. military and private contractors to get the job done, including erecting the nation's largest immigrant detention site on Fort Bliss in El Paso, Texas.

But stewards of Japanese American history, including the children and grandchildren of those who were held in detention, are criticizing the use of Fort Bliss and the plans to expand immigrant detention on American military bases.

Fort Bliss was a "cog" in the United States Japanese internment machine, said Brian Niiva, a historian and content director at Densho, a nonprofit that chronicles Japanese American intern-

U.S. News ranks 8 First Coast high schools among FL's best

Eight Northeast Florida schools ranked among the state's 50 best public high schools in new U.S. News & World Report ratings released as schools nationally settle into the 2025-26 year.

Duval County's school district runs five of the topscoring schools (all magnets) and St. Johns County has three.

U.S. News ranked 654 public schools around the state and almost 18,000 nationally for its annual ratings. Schools were scored based on a series of factors ranging from graduation rates to scores on standardized state tests and college readiness scores, which measured results from either Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate exams.

2 guilty pleas in gang war killing

6 charged in shooting that left 7-year-old dead

The court cases in the January shooting death of 7-year-old Breon Allen Jr. in what Jacksonville police called a gang hit on his cousin are proceeding at an efficient pace with two of the six defendants already pleading

Breon and 21-year-old Lafayette Mango Jr. were struck in a barrage of gunfire in an ambush drive-by after leaving a home and walking on Commonwealth Avenue, the Sheriff's Office said. The older target survived critical injuries, but the boy known as "Dusse" did not.

His photos and reward offers were posted by the Sheriff's Office and the act denounced by Sheriff T.K. Waters.

In March the Sheriff's Office announced the arrests of Keith Bernard Fields Jr., 18, Dannel Lenoir Larkins, 20, Keith Bernard Johnson, 21, and Zharod Deangelo Sykes, 24, on charges of second-degree murder, conspiracy to commit murder and attempted first-degree murder.

A couple of weeks later the final arrests of Donte Michael McGhee and Tavaris Keon Kelly, both 17, were an $nounced\, stating\, they\, were\, determined$ to be the shooters of the bunch.

The warrants say it stemmed from an ongoing dispute between gangs ATK and 6 Block. It particularly referenced a rap song "6 Ways to Die" made by Mango and another ATK member disrespecting slain 6 Block affiliates, including Julio Foolio (real name Charles Jones II).




