Commissioners of Broward city want \$30,000 pay raise. Residents are outraged

Big drama is brewing in a tiny Broward city. Residents of West Park,

a municipality south of Hollywood, are sounding the alarm on what some call "self-serving" proposed spending by city commissioners ahead of a commission meeting today. In one of Broward's smallest cities, three out of five commissioners recommended

raising their salaries to \$40,000, effectively quadrupling their current \$9,600 salaries. The final budget public hearing is at 6 p.m., followed by the regular city commission meeting at 7.

"What they do in Hollywood, this city can't do. We only have 16,000 residents," said Carolyn Hardy, 75, a longtime West Park resident. "When you got little money, you work with

Lawmakers are cracking down on posts about **Charlie Kirk.** What about free speech?

Florida politicians insist their efforts to punish Floridians over comments that they don't like about Charlie Kirk's assassination aren't flying in the face of the First Amendment.

Free-speech advocates aren't so sure.

"It's a massive freespeech problem," Florida **International University** law professor Howard Wasserman said. "This is exactly what the First Amendment prohibits, which is the government punishing people — including through something like firing them from their job or pushing a private employer to fire them from their job because the government or people in the government don't like what somebody says."

Florida lawmakers have been on the front lines of a mounting effort on the right to punish people who have criticized Kirk after the conservative activist was shot and killed at a campus event

in Utah last week. Florida's Department of Education vowed to investigate teachers who make "despicable com-

ments on social media regarding the horrific assassination of Charlie Kirk." Secretary of State and former Florida Sen. Marco Rubio told Fox News the country should be revoking visas of people who "celebrate the murder" of Kirk.

And some Floridians have already faced professional consequences for their Kirk comments. including a University of Miami neurologist who was fired, a Florida Atlantic University professor who was placed on administrative leave and a Clay County teacher who was suspended.

Trump says U.S. sank 2 more drug boats from Venezuela and killed 3 'terrorists'

U.S. naval forces in the Caribbean have sunk a third alleged drug-running boat off the coast of Venezuela, President Donald Trump said Tues-

"We knocked off, actually, three boats — not two - but you saw two," Trump said on the White House lawn following the release of footage Monday showing three alleged drug smugglers being killed in a U.S. airstrike. That came after a Sept. 2 strike in which 11 people aboard a similar vessel

were reportedly killed. The president did not say how many people were killed in the third

The president was responding to statements by Venezuelan leader Nicolás Maduro, who accused the U.S. of plotting an invasion of his country.

"Stop sending members of the Tren de Aragua to the United States. Stop sending drugs to the United States," Trump said of the Venezuelan gang.

The latest announcement came a day after the president posted on social media that U.S. forces had attacked a boat leaving Venezuela, killing
