## Trump: US, Iran reach peace deal

Agreement's details still emerging, but Friday signing set

ISLAMABAD — The United States and Iran have

reached a deal to end the war and open the Strait of Hormuz, offering relief to the global economy more than three months since fighting began.

Full details of the deal were not immediately available Sunday. The signing will be Friday in Switzerland. Key issues like Iran's nuclear program are expected to be

addressed later.

President Donald Trump confirmed a deal had been reached and said he had authorized an end to the U.S. naval blockade of Iranian ports in the Strait of Hormuz.

"Congratulations to all!" he wrote on social media, without providing details. He added, "Ships of the World, start your engines. Let the oil

flow!"

The U.S. has said it would ease its blockade of Iranian ports as the strait reopens, and would agree to relax sanctions to allow Iran to sell more oil and strengthen its battered economy.

Iran's deputy foreign minister, Kazem Gharibabadi, confirmed the deal on state TV but said Iran would

not start implementing it until it was signed Friday.

Iranian state media reported key mediator Pakistan's announcement of the deal, after a day in which Israel, sidelined from the negotiations, attacked Beirut's southern suburbs while pursuing the Iranian-backed Hezbollah and posed a threat to the discus-

sions nearing an end.

"Both sides have declared the immediate and permanent termination of military operations on all fronts, including in Lebanon," Pakistan said, adding that mediators this week will facilitate meetings to "lay the foundation for the technical talks."

## As midterms near, poll finds one in five Hispanic voters rethinking support for Trump

Hispanic voters, who have been a pillar of support in Florida for President Donald Trump and the state's Republicans, don't approve of his performance in office. And that poll finding could have implications for the November midterm elections.

One in five Hispanic voters in Florida who voted for Trump in 2024 told pollsters that if they could get a redo, they definitely or probably wouldn't vote for him

again. Nationally even more Hispanic voters, one in four, feel that way.

Disenchantment with Trump among Hispanic voters in Florida, the recent poll found, is driven by the issue that is affecting all kinds of voters everywhere in the country: the cost of living and what they see as an inadequate or nonexistent response from Washington, D.C.

Still, the survey conducted by a bipartisan polling team for the organization Unido-

## South Florida bankruptcy filings increase

Consumers, businesses deal with war impact, rising prices

South Florida personal and business bankruptcies are becoming the proverbial canary in the coal mine for financial distress as Iran war-driven energy prices and other rising costs add pressure to the ability to pay off debts.

Figures from the U.S. Bankruptcy Court the Southern District of Flor-

ida show filings are on the rise this year versus 2025 for Chapter 7 liquidations, Chapter 11 reorganizations and Chapter 13 bankruptcies that carry repayment plans.

"I believe this is the beginning of the tidal wave," said Fort Lauderdale bankruptcy lawyer Chad Van Horn of the Van Horn Law Group. "There is so much debt in the system and, as you know, wages are not going up. Everyone's putting purchases on credit cards. The consumers are cracking."

"We're in the top six in filing bankruptcies nation-

## Amazon One Medical partners with Baptist Health South Florida

Amazon One Medical has agreed to refer all of its primary care patients in South Florida who need follow-up to Baptist Health South Florida specialists and outpatient facilities.

The partnership, announced last week, between the South Florida health system and Amazon's medical arm benefits both entities, and some of the 900,000 patients who access virtual and in-person primary care through their Amazon Prime membership. The partnership becomes effective as of Aug. 1.

"We are two innovative organizations looking to advance the way healthcare is delivered," said Nancy Batista-Rodriguez,

chief executive officer of Baptist Outpatient Services. "Healthcare is not easy to navigate, and we have specialized institutes where their patients will be able to get follow-up care."

In Palm Beach County, the arrangement will see Amazon One Medical patients referred to experts across multiple specialties, as well as referred for inpatient needs to three area hospitals — Boca Raton Regional Hospital, Bethesda East, and Bethesda West. In Broward, Amazon One Medical patients will eventually be referred to specialists at the new Baptist Health South Florida hospital and medical offices in Sunrise or its outpatient specialty care centers in Plantation and Pembroke Pines. And in Miami-Dade, Amazon One members will be able to tran-
