It only takes a few hours a week to change a student's life. Locally, multiple organizations like Tutors for Kids,

Dynamic Dog Club, Take Stock in Children of Lake & Sumter Counties and Help Us Grow Reading Program are looking for volunteers to do just that.

Tutors for Kids is one of the largest volunteer organizations in the area, with hundreds of members helping students stay at grade level in their studies.

"You're making the lives better for a lot of our children," said Shirley Potts, treasurer and lead tutor recruitment coodinator for the group. "We see over 1,000 children every week."

Potts, of the Village of Hemingway, said the group is processing all of the tutor requests coming from school administration and expects more requests by mid-September.

There are 1,430,000 total veterans in the Sunshine State. Florida has the third largest veteran population in the nation behind only California and Texas.

The percent of Florida veterans who are female, according to the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs. That is just slightly more than the national percentage, which was 11.3% in 2023, according to the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs. By 2043, women are projected to make up 17.2% of the U.S. veteran population.
