The use of AI in the workplace is rising, according to research by American analytics and advisory company Gallup. In the past two years, the percentage of U.S. employees who say they have used AI in their role a few times a year or more has nearly doubled, from 21% to 40%. Frequent AI use (a few times a week or more) has also nearly doubled, from 11% to 19% since Gallup's first measure in 2023. Daily use has doubled in the past 12 months alone, from 4% to 8%.
