#### Private schools welcome 1st round of Promise recipients

This is first year for Georgia Promise Scholarships

The 2025-2026 school year began for local schools this month, and for three private schools in the area. the new school year marks the first round of students who have received the Georgia Promise Scholarship.

#### **WHAT IS THE PROMISE SCHOLARSHIP**

The Promise Scholarship, referred to as a voucher by some, is a \$6,500 scholarship awarded to students to attend a private school

of their choice or homeschool.

To receive the scholarship, a student must be attending a public school within the attendance zone of a school named an underachieving school. Three Rome City Schools, Main Elementary, West Central Elementary and Rome Middle were placed on that list.

Students who meet this criteria can apply for the scholarship at My-GeorgiaPromise.org. If approved, they must complete the application and the admission process for their chosen private school.






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
