RTD to test route chang

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The Rome Transit Department is moving forward with plans to roll out changes to their current fixed routes and test micro transit feasibility through a proposed Saturday service.

The major differences between fixed and overlap bus stops with routes and micro transit are that traditional fixed routes follow the same path at scheduled intervals and micro transit offers pick ups and drop offs, much like services such as Uber and Lyft.

Consultant Jim Moore of Moore and Associates Inc. presented findings from a feasibility study to the Rome City Commission during caucus Dec. 8. He detailed a framework for making the department more efficient and expanding service to areas that have a need.

The study shows some routes are too long

others, causing service delays that often top more than the desired hour, Moore said.

"The routes have just grown too long," Moore said.

The idea is to improve performance and safety and be reactive to needs of those using public transportation, he added.

Transit Director Courtnay Griffin said the changes are ambitious but workable. and a part of their overall mission to pres-

ent transit as the first choice for alternative transportation. "It's a tall order but we are excited," Grif-

fin said. "These are not huge changes for the department, but they are huge changes for the community."

The study also recommends expanding the paratransit service area in Garden Lakes and growing community partnerships with local businesses and colleges to market to those who could benefit from modified routes.


For the title of Literacy Leader, third and sixth grades are designated 'gateway grades" and are awarded the title based on their Milestones scores.
