Floyd man sentenced to prison for threatening President Trump

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A Floyd County man has been sentenced to three years in federal prison for threatening to kill President Donald Trump via social media on June 26, 2025.

Jauan Rashun Porter,

29, of Rome was arrested in August after he joined a TikTok livestream about Trump captioned "Alligator Alcatraz" about an immigration detention center in the Florida Everglades.

Porter was sentenced last week by U.S. District Judge William M. Ray II to serve

3 years and five months in prison, followed by 3 years of supervised release. He was convicted Oct. 7, pleading guilty to one count of transmitting interstate threats.

According to the indictment, Porter said "So, there's only one way to make America great and that is putting

a bullet in between Trump's eyes." He also threatened to kill federal agents if they came to his door.

"The allegations against Porter are serious and required a swift, decisive, and collaborative response,"

Air Force Thunderbirds will host reception at Wings Over North Georgia event in April

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The U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds will host a reception for the public when they're in Rome in April for the Wings Over North Georgia Air Show, according to the promoter, JLC AirShow Management.

Typically, when the Thunderbirds have performed at the air show they were stationed at Dobbins Air Reserve Base because the runway at the Richard B. Russell Regional Airport in Armuchee was not long enough for the General Dynamics F-16C Fighting Falcon aircraft they fly.

However, the main runway was extended to 7,000 feet in 2024 in a \$5.7 million project funded by the 2013 special purpose, local

option sales tax package approved by voters.

The extended runway will allow the Thunderbirds to be stationed here, and allow the team to be more involved with community events before the show, such as visits with local students, hosting a local nonprofit organization and honoring a local "Hometown Hero" for a recognition flight, according to organizers.

John Cowman, president of JLC AirShow Management, secured a spring commitment date from the Thunderbirds for this year that has required a quick turnaround. WONG was fortunate to benefit from an open date in the Thunderbirds 2026 schedule, Cowman
