'Action bar challenge' draws a crowd at North Idaho State Fair

COEUR d'ALENE — One hundred seconds is not a very long time.

But when attempting Action Entertainment's "action bar challenge," it can feel like an eternity.

The challenge, which has become a staple at the North Idaho State Fair, is simple: spend \$10 to hang from a metal bar using an over- or underhand grip

without letting go for 100 seconds. grip strength, as the bar itself After that one minute and 40 provides no resistance. seconds is up, win \$100.

It sounds easy enough to the hundreds that attempt each summer, but Action Entertainment only sees an average of 30 to 35 winners over 10 days at the fair, according to owner Andy Smith.

As of Wednesday, 16 people had successfully completed the challenge.

The key, Smith explained, is

"Overall body strength actually has very little to do with it." Smith said.

Though based in Billings, Mont., Action Entertainment has returned to the fair for the past seven summers, always drawing crowds as people cheer on those willing to take on the challenge.

Unapproved ambulance purchase sparks debate

WALLACE — Concerns over ambulance funding and purchasing decisions resurfaced during a recent meeting between the Shoshone County commissioners and members of the Shoshone County Ambulance Service District (SCASD).

Last month, the commissioners met with Shoshone County District 2 Fire Chief Scott Dietrich, who informed them that SCASD lacked the funds to cover the cost of four ambulances ordered over the past year.

Dietrich said SCASD had overestimated its annual budget
