Gookin wins Coeur d'Alene mayor's race; Miller, Evans easily reelected to City Council

> Longtime Coeur d'Alene City Councilman Dan Gookin ran for mayor on a campaign of providing stronger leadership at City Hall.

He'll have the next four years to deliver on that pledge.

Gookin received 3,265 votes, 34.1%, in Tuesday's General

Election to beat Debbie Loffman, endorsed by the Kootenai County Republican Central Committee, with

2,674 votes, 28%, Mayor Woody McEvers with 2,527 votes, 26.4%,

while dentist John Pulsipher was fourth with 1,084 votes,

Gookin found a following in his role as a man of the people, opposing tax hikes, vowing to protect neighborhoods and supporting small businesses.

He said he appreciated the support and was honored to be elected mayor.

"A little numb," he said when contacted late Tuesday night after full results were

posted on the Kootenai County Elections site that reported 30,705 total votes were cast countywide, 28% voter turnout

Gookin said he had a tremendous team behind him.

"I would not have run if I did not have so many people who were positive, supporting me and helping me through all the weird stuff," he said.

Westlund wins Post Falls mayor's seat

Plew, Lucca lead the way for City Council

POST FALLS — From the ranks of Post Falls City Council, Randy Westlund won the mayoral race Tuesday with 2,532 votes, 39%.

Incumbent Ron Jacobson, Scot

were neck and neck throughout the night as votes came in for the three conservative candidates.

Haug received

Haug and Westlund Jacobson received 1,870 votes, coming in at 29%.

Haug called it a "very close race" and said he was thankful for all the support over the past 10 months.

"The good thing is all of the candidates are very capable 2,131 votes, 33% and and Post Falls will be in good

hands," Haug said.

Westlund said he feels wellprepared for the job of mayor and is confident in his team's capabilities.

"I'm excited about the future," Westlund said.

POST FALLS — With their Kootenai County Fire and Rescue signs held high, Justin Capaul and Mathew Lee made their presence known to drivers by waving on Spokane Street outside the Post Falls Library throughout the afternoon on Election Day.

"It's been a lot of honks," Capaul said. "We've had a lot of support and we've been able to tell our story to a lot of people who didn't know how we're funded."

Despite their efforts, KCFR's permanent levy override failed at the polls Tuesday, receiving 5,971 yes votes, 62%, to 3,697 no votes, 38%. It required two-thirds voter approval to pass.

The \$6 million permanent override levv was a tool which Interim Chief Pete Holley said would have helped the department keep up with population growth and provide stable emergency

Previously, KCFR asked for a bond to replace a few stations and build a new station in 2021.

DePriest, Erickson win in Hayden

Charlene Phipps elected mayor of Spirit Lake

Election Day races were held Tuesday across the smaller municipalities of North Idaho, from Athol to Worley.

HAYDEN CITY COUNCIL

Incumbent Ed DePriest won Hayden City Council Seat 2 with 1,777 votes, 61%, versus Luke Sommer with 1,121 votes,

Earlier on Tuesday, challenger David Erickson had noted he was cautiously optimistic about the race against incumbent Sandy White

for Hayden City Council 1,708 votes, 59%, to 1,187 votes, 41%, for White.

"Voters made it clear they want steady leadership and responsible growth, and I'm ready to get to work with the council to make that happen," Erickson said.

Erickson thanked White for her years of service to Hayden and stated he was humbled and honored by the support and grateful for the chance to serve the

White stated she had

been prayerfully awaiting Seat 4. Erickson won with the results from the race. "I'd like to say thank

you to all of the voters in Hayden who took the time to vote for the City Council positions and to participate in our constitutional republic," White said.

HAYDEN LAKE CITY COUNCIL

For Hayden Lake City Council Seat 2, Incumbent Dan Baker was ousted by Kurt Lyon, 107 votes, 45% to 133 votes, 55%.

Several board seats ere up for election Tuesday in the Coeur d'Alene, Post Falls, Lakeland Joint, Kootenai and Plummer-Worley school districts.

COEUR d'ALENE

Rick Rasmussen defeated Michael Burns in the race for the Coeur

d'Alene School Board Trustee Zone 1 seat, with Rasmussen winning by large

margin of 2,394 votes (61.2%) over Burns' 1,518 votes (38.8%), according to Kootenai County Elections results with 100% of precincts reporting.

Rasmussen was appointed as an interim board member in July to fill the vacancy left by former trustee Allie Anderton, who resigned from the board in April following a DUI arrest.

Rasmussen, a 1984 Coeur d'Alene High
