Schweitzer delays opening

Skiers and snowboarders will have to wait a week longer than expected to head up to Schweitzer, after the Sandpoint ski resort announced its opening date was being pushed back to Nov. 28.

Tom Chasse, chief operations officer at Schweitzer, said the amount of rain and high nighttime temperatures have limited snow buildup on the mountain. The mountain was originally set to open Nov. 21, but Chasse called the delay a shortterm setback.

"Snowmaking temperatures in the upper teens and low relative humidity,' Chasse said. "We have yet to see that come through the region."
