## State's attorney: ICE agent can't be charged

### Kane prosecutor won't move against federal official

Despite seeing grounds for aggravated battery charges, Kane County State's Attorney Jamie Moser says she cannot legally file criminal charges against a federal agent who used excessive force during an ICE incident late last year.

Moser reviewed hours of video from police body and squad car cameras, including footage showing one situation in which a federal

agent shot a man with a pepper ball that then ricocheted and struck a woman in the face, she said.

In her opinion, it showed the agent violated state law on Dec. 6 by using excessive force, she said. In any other circumstance, it would have warranted an aggravated battery charge, Mosser said.

"However, federal law constrains my ability to charge federal agents when they commit state crimes," she said.

The legal constraint is the U.S. Constitution's Supremacy Clause, which says a state court has no criminal jurisdiction over a federal agent while they are perform-

## Pritzker urges criminal investigations of officers

A state commission scrutinizing the Chicago-area immigration crackdown this past fall sent its findings to law enforcement last week, with some members and Gov. JB Pritzker pushing for investigations they said could lead to criminal charges against federal agents involved in violent episodes during the notorious Operation Midway

Blitz raids.

Since the 64-day crackdown, some advocates have been disappointed at what they see as a lack of accountability for U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement and Border Patrol agents who repeatedly used force against immigrants, U.S. citizens, protesters, journalists and neighborhood residents, including in the killing of Silverio

## New amenities coming to Elgin's Wing Park Family Aquatic Center

### Elgin facility will have cabanas, new diving board

When the city of Elgin's pools open in just a few weeks, patrons will be able to check out three new features — a children's play structure, new cabanas and a three-meter diving board — at the Wing Park Family Aquatic Center.

All three should be ready by Saturday, May 30, the first day

of the pool season for both Wing Park at 1030 Wing St. and Lords Park Family Aquatic Center at 325 Hiawatha Drive.

"On the south end of the (Wing Park) pool, a brand-new play structure has replaced the former boat slide," city spokeswoman Josie Beecher-Crotty said.

Designed for children between the ages of 1 and 10, the attraction features a small water slide and interactive water table, Beecher-Crotty said.

The new cabana structures are under construction and should be ready by summer, and the new diving board is already in place, she

said.

"These (cabana) spaces are planned to be available for daytime rentals, offering a new option for parties and special events," Beecher-Crotty said.

In addition to the new features, both Wing Park and Lords Park pools have undergone significant improvements during the off-season, including resurfaced pool vessels and concrete that's either been repaired or replaced, she said.

"Wing Park's dual body slides have also been refurbished, following similar updates completed at Lords Park last season," she said.

The aquatic centers had a total

of 37,063 visits last year. Both offer double water slides, a volleyball court, bathhouse, competition lap pool, children's play area and concession building.

Wing Park's pool is 22,653 square feet in size and has a diving well and four water play features. It began life in 1908 as the Elgin's first pool when the city dammed up Tyler Creek and created a swimming hole. A concrete bottom was added in 1924 and since then it has undergone numerous expansions and improvements that eventually resulted in the existing aquatic center.

Lords Park pool has 14,142 square

feet of swimming space and three water features. The pool underwent its last major reconstruction in 2000. Three years ago, the city considered closing the pool as a cost-saving measure but residents fought its closure.

Both pools have open swim hours from noon to 6 p.m. Sunday through Thursday and noon to 7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday. Lap swim hours are 7 to 9 a.m. and 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. daily at Wing Park and 7:30 to 11:30 a.m. at Lords Park.

Admission is \$10 for resident youths and adults, \$15 for nonres-

### Business set to expand with store

The Aurora City Council on Tuesday gave the green light to a downtown arcade that's looking to expand and combine with a record store.

Yetee Station, which is currently at 11 N. Broadway, and Superjumbo Records, which is currently at 102 E. Galena Blvd., are both moving and joining together to be Superjumbo Records and Arcade. It is set to be located at 55 S. Lake St., which is the building just outside downtown that used to hold the antique store Warehouse 55 before it moved to Batavia last year.

Not only are the two businesses running out of space at their current locations, but the idea was always to make Yetee Station and Superjumbo into a single, cohesive thing, said Mike Mancuso. He owns both businesses and is also the co-owner of TheYetee.com, an e-commerce business also located in Aurora that is known for its daily-changing selection of T-shirt designs.

Specifically, the Aurora City Council voted Tuesday to give the new Superjumbo Records and Arcade a conditional use for Special Purpose Recreational Institution — which is required for the arcade portion of the business to operate.

The conditional use was approved through the Tuesday meeting's consent agenda, which is typically reserved for routine or non-controversial items that are all

approved with a single vote. So, the Aurora City Council did not specifically discuss the item at the meeting.

Once the new location opens, it will be "just a giant, cool place to hang out," Mancuso previously told The Beacon-News. He said that having both businesses under the same roof, with a lot more space, is a "dream."

The businesses' current locations are set to close on May 3, according to Mancuso.

The record store portion of the business should be open within that same week, he has said, but the arcade part will take some extra time because of additional approvals needed from the city.

Although he was reluctant to give a specific timeframe for open-
