South of Chicago Groceries seeks to help neighbors, but needs SNAP

BLOOMINGTON - Less than two months after opening South of Chicago Groceries in August, Dabrona Alzebdiah was working on getting approvals to start accepting Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program payments from customers

on Bloomington's west side. That was in late September.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture administers SNAP and EBT, which is short for electronic benefits transfers, but on Oct. 1, the federal government shut down.

"There's not a day that doesn't go by (when) we have someone walk in and say,

'You take EBT?'" she said Thursday, Nov. 13 inside the store at 903 W. Wood St. in Bloomington. "Not a day that doesn't go by. ... It would help tremendously, because those the same people that I turn away and say, 'I'm sorry, we don't accept it,' have to find a way to eat."

Longtime assistant anchors **Pritzker**

Chief of staff shapes governor's path

SPRINGFIELD - As President Donald Trump pondered deploying federal troops to Chicago in late August, Anne Caprara posted a 34-second video to her sizable social media following.

Caprara, the veteran Democratic political operative who managed Illinois Gov. JB Pritzker's 2018 campaign and has served as his chief of staff ever since, filmed a bustling block on a sunny Sunday morning in Chicago's Lakeview neighborhood. Her voiceover deadpanned, "We're really in an emergency situation here in Chicago."

"Things are so really, really bad," said Caprara, 46. "I mean, I think there might be a line at my Starbucks - not sure how I'm going to deal with that."

Less than a day later, Pritzker took out his own cellphone as he walked the city's lakefront trail in the early morning, recording the glistening water of Lake Michigan to his right, the towering skyscrapers in the background and a steady stream of joggers and walkers.

"Doesn't feel like a hellhole here," Pritzker said, in a similar deadpan tone. "In fact, everyone's having a great time and enjoying themselves. So I don't know who in Washington thinks that Chicago is some sort of hellhole, but you may need to look inward."

The back-to-back posts represented more than a clapback at Trump's rhetoric. They showed how much his chief of staff and closest strategist shapes messaging for Pritzker, who has emerged as one of Trump's most pugnacious critics and is widely viewed as a contender for the 2028 Democratic presidential nomination.

They occupy different roles - she the staffer, he the principal – and they have different bully pulpits, but their message is aligned. When it comes to dealing with Trump, they are on "Team Fight."

Trump is largely the reason for their close partnership and friendship. Without the 45th and 47th president, Caprara might never have interacted with Pritzker beyond a chance encounter at Hillary Clinton's election night watch party in November 2016.
