Two senators announce major changes in their roles

Within days of the Senate voting against mid-census redistricting, two Senators — who voted in favor of House Bill 1032 — announced major changes in their roles, which isn't uncommon after a majority party fails to pass a piece of legislation.

State Sen. Andy Zay, R-Hun-

tington, announced Monday that he will resign from the Senate after being appointed as chair of the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission. Zay served the Senate for 10 years, and his last day will be Jan. 8, 2026.

"I am proud of the work I accomplished during my time in the Senate and am grateful for the dedicated staff, state agencies and community leaders who helped make this progress possible. While my role as a public servant is changing, my commitment to serving Hoosiers remains the same," Zav said.

Senate President Pro Tem

Rodric Bray, R-Martinsville, congratulated Zay on his appointment in a statement Monday.

"Our caucus certainly wishes him all the best as he takes on this new public service role," Bray said.

Zay, who voted in favor of mid-census redistricting, issued a statement after the Senate's 31-19 defeat of the measure Thursday stating he believed in "strengthening" the state's congressional districts.

#### Man, 20, wounded in Gary police shooting

A Gary police officer shot a 20-year-old man during a service call Sunday afternoon, officials said.

Around 4 p.m. Sunday, officers responded to the 2100 block of Tennessee Street for a "potentially suicidal individual" who was "cutting himself," Lake County Sheriff Oscar Martinez said in a release. When the arrived, he ran from the home.

Gary Police said in a statement that officers found the man two blocks east near 22nd Avenue and Ohio Street. The man was still holding a knife and "covered in blood."

Police allege the man ran at an officer, ignored verbal warnings and didn't drop the knife.

The officer shot the man, who was taken to a Chicago hospital. The officer has been placed on administrative leave pending the investigation's outcome, police said. Neither the officer nor the man who was shot was identified.

The Lake County Sheriff's Department is investigating the shooting.
