Indiana won't do mid-cycle redistricting

No December session; GOP leaders in both chambers say they don't have the votes

Indiana Senate Republicans said Friday they are rejecting President Donald Trump's push for congressional redistricting – a move immediately blasted by Gov. Mike Braun

and Trump allies.

Senate President Pro Tem Rodric Bray said in a statement Friday afternoon that the Senate won't take up the issue, as was expected in an unusual December session. 'Over the last several months,

Senate Republicans have given very serious and thoughtful consider-



ation to the concept of redrawing our state's congressional maps," Bray said in a statement released by his office. "Today, I'm announcing there are not enough votes to move that

idea forward, and the Senate will not reconvene in December." Indiana lawmakers were scheduled to meet starting Dec. 1 to consider drawing more Republican-leaning U.S. House districts ahead of next year's midterm elections following a monthslong pressure campaign by Trump's administration

and his supporters.

If the decision by Senate Republicans stands, Indiana would become the first GOP-led state to outright turn down Trump's wish to squeeze out more Republican-friendly congressional seats ahead of the 2026 midterm elec-

Braun had endorsed Trump's push and called for legislators to convene Nov. 3 in a special session to redraw the congressional maps. Legislative leaders had delayed that to Dec. 1.

Riverscape, Vigo County parks, constructing overlook at Dewey Point

Wabashiki wetlands enthusiasts will soon have a new overlook at Dewey Point in West Terre Haute.

It's under construction, and the goal is to have it completed by mid-December, said Michael Shaw, vice president of Earl Rodgers and Associates, the project's general contractor.

Shaw also is former president and a current board member of Wabash Valley Riverscape.

The overlook is a joint effort of Riverscape, the Vigo County Parks Department and county government. The Wabash Valley Community Foundation also has been a contributor.

Vigo School Board OKs 2-year pact with teachers

The Vigo County School Board on Friday unanimously approved a two-year collective bargaining agreement with the Vigo County Teachers Association.

The board voted 6-0 in favor; board member Amy Lore was not in attendance.

Under terms of the contract, teachers will receive a \$2,000 pay increase over two years, while qualifying "lost generation" teachers would receive \$4,500. Teachers who are VCTA
