# State to fund weight-loss drugs

Around 80,000 people out of the 1.2m classified as obese

in Ireland will likely avail of State-funded weight-loss injections if the drugs are approved for medical card holders or under the HSE's drug payment scheme. Donal O'Shea, the HSE's

national clinical lead for obesity, said a health technology assessment evaluating the medical, social, ethical, and economic implications — of the weight-loss wonder-drug Mounjaro is to be published in the coming weeks.

It is the "precursor to making a decision about who will get it", he said.

> March 2025. As the drug is not yet covered by the public scheme for weight-loss patients, Wegovy is listed, for the first three dosages, at €240 per month on one pharmacy website, increasing to €320 and €355 for higher dosages.

Eli Lilly has applied for HSE reimbursement for Mounjaro for both weight loss treatment and dia-

With a valid prescription, several pharmacies currently list Mounjaro's starting price at €275 per

This rises to as much as €595 per month for the highest required dose.

Carroll MacNeill said that the application for Mounjaro under the reimbursement scheme could be approved by the end of the

Prof O'Shea told the Irish Examiner that the health technology assessment on Mounjaro will likely limit who can initially get the injections due to the huge costs involved for the HSE of providing the treat-

"I'm concerned about the lengths people are having to go to access what are effective, safe treatments," said Prof O'Shea.

The HSE is about to publish its [health technology assessment] on Mouniaro. This is the precursor to making a decision about who will get it.

"It's likely to come in somewhere quite along the lines of its availability in the UK, which is for people with a BMI [body mass index] over 35, plus complications.

That will have it available to maybe 80,000 people in Ireland. The bottom line is you have 25% of the population living with obesity. That's 1.2m

"They simply can't begin by letting it be open to everybody, just on a cost

"We have to make sure we start using it in, initially, the high-risk group and then widen out its

Prof O'Shea added that he "desperately" wants the treatments available, but that it has to be "brought in at a point where it won't break you financially".

# Fewer remote working roles available

Recruitment firm Morgan McKinley's global foreign direct investment director Trayc Keevans said they have definitely seen remote and hybrid working options reduced as an offering for potential employees, particularly in the financial services and technology firms.

"There has been a big drop in remote-first opportunities, probably less than 15%, I would say, of all positions being advertised and offered certainly through an agency format.

The conversations we're having with emplovers, it has been very much taken off the table for loads of reasons," she said, though she added that some small and mediumsized companies still use the option of hybrid work as an incentive to attract talent from bigger firms.

Ms Keevans said one of the main reasons they are hearing from employers is that in-office work is a "retention tool" in terms of cultural engagement.

Mr Morrissey said he has noticed a marked increase in the amount of contract work employers are seek-

"What companies are growing more is their contracting because we've seen that part of our business grow significantly,' he said. "Since the start of the year, we would have grown our contracting base by at least 16%.

"Whereas on the permanent side, we would have seen a reduction in those roles being available.
