Trump sues Wall Street Journal owners over Epstein letter

Donald Trump has filed a lawsuit against Rupert Murdoch and News Corp after the Wall Street Journal (WSJ) published a report of a letter that the US president allegedly wrote for the late paedophile Jeffrey Epstein.

Court records show Mr Trump filed a case in Florida federal court yesterday against the WSJ's parent companies News Corp and Dow Jones, two WSJ reporters and the newspaper's owner, Mr Murdoch.
