



Gerry Hutch will be able to run in next year's Dublin by election and also take a seat in the Dáil, if he wins, due to a gap in the law obliging newly-elected TDs to have their tax affairs in order before taking their seats.

"Beyond investigating the matter and providing a report to the relevant Committee on Members' Interest, the Standards in Public Office Commission does not have a role in relation to contraventions of

the tax clearance provisions of the Standards in Public Office Act." Sipo told The Irish Times. "The commission has no role in terms of removing a TD from their seat.'

Hutch was arrested in Lanzarote last October as part of a money laundering inquiry. He was released on bail of €100,000 in early November. Though he remains under investigation there, that does not block him running in the byelection next year.

At last November's general election, he secured 3,100 first preference votes and narrowly missed out to Labour's Marie Sherlock on the fourth and final seat. He has taken to social media over the last week to tease his running in the byelection.
