# U.S. to downsize Kiryat Gat center and house Gazans in Israeli-controlled Strip

America is seeking to reduce its military presence at the Civil-Military Coordinating Center it established in Israel, transfer the center to civilian hands and subordinate it to the international Board of Peace that is supposed to be established soon and oversee postwar arrangements in the Gaza Strip, two American officials said.

One source said the Board of Peace, which will be headed by U.S. President Donald Trump, is a "cornerstone" of the American plan for Gaza.

"As outlined in the UNSC resolution adopted this week, the Board of Peace will coordinate the delivery of humanitarian assistance and facilitate Gaza's development," he said, referring to the UN Security Council. "It will also support a technocratic committee of Palestinians responsible for day-to-day operations of Gaza's civil service and administration while the Palestinian Authority implements their reform program."

As a result of the decision to civilianize the coordinating center, some of the 200

### Gazan sources: IDF airstrikes kill at least 24 people

Israeli airstrikes across Gaza killed at least 24 Palestinians and wounded several others, local health authorities said on Saturday. in the latest test of a fragile cease-fire between Hamas and Israel.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office described the strikes as a response to Hamas cease-fire violations, which the group denied.

Also on Saturday, the IDF said that 17 Palestinian militants who tried to flee the underground complex in Rafah were either killed or captured, with 11 killed and six detained.

One strike targeted a vehicle, killing 11 and wounding 20 Palestinians in Gaza City's Rimal neighborhood, said Rami Mhanna, managing director of Al-Shifa Hospital, where the casualties were taken. The majority of those wounded were children, director Mohamed

Abu Selmiya said. Another strike targeting a house near Al-Awda Hospital in central Gaza killed at least three people and wounded 11 others, according to the hospital. It said a strike on a house in Nuseirat camp in central Gaza killed one child and wounded 16 others.

A strike targeting a house in Deir al-Balah in central Gaza killed three people, including a woman, according to Al-Aqsa Hospital.

"Suddenly, I heard a powerful explosion," said Khalil Abu Hatab in Deir al-Balah. "I looked outside and saw smoke covering the entire area. I couldn't see a thing. I covered my ears and started shouting to the others in the tent to run. When I looked again, I realized the upper floor of my neighbor's house was gone."

Tens of thousands of Israelis protested across the country on Saturday evening, calling to establish a state commission of inquiry into the October 7 attack.

ma Square. Most leaders of the Israeli opposition - excluding the Arab parties – attended, marking one of the first mass protests since the return of most Israeli hostages from Gaza, as lawmakers eye elections scheduled for next year. Organizers said dozens of Knesset members joined the crowds.

At Tel Aviv's Hostage Square, the weekly rally organized by the Hostages and Missing Families Forum featured speeches by relatives of Dror Or and Ran Gvili, whose bodies are still held in Gaza. The third deceased hostage whose body is still in Gaza is Sudthisak Rinthalak.

Additional demonstrations took place in Haifa, Be'er Sheva and more than a dozen communities and intersections nationwide.

At Tel Aviv's Habima Square, thousands of people gathered to demand a state commission of inquiry. Former and current politicians, including Benny Gantz, Gadi Eisenkot, Yair Golan and Gilad Kariv attended.

Former right-wing Prime Minister Naftali Bennett, who has said he will head a party in the next election, urged supporters to join: "We were slaughtered in our own land, and to this moment no one has stood up and said, 'I am responsible.

Names and photos of Israelis killed during the war were projected onto the central screen above the stage.

# Deputy AG: Gov't failing to fight crime in Arab communities

Israel's deputy attorney general warned that the government is failing to act against crime in the Arab community and stalling key legislation meant to bolster law enforcement efforts to combat said crime, in a letter issued on Thursday to the prime minister's office.

The sharply worded letter was sent by Deputy Attorney General Sharon Afek to Roi Cahlon, head of the Prime Minister's Office task force on crime and violence in Arab society, warning that "the strategic threat posed by major crime in general, and crime in the Arab community in particular, is extremely severe."

Since the beginning of the year, 226 people from the Arab community in Israel were killed - a record number - according to Haaretz's

monitoring of the situation. Afek sent the letter in response to claims made by Cahlon that Attorney General Gali Baharav-Miara is refraining from convening the top-level team she heads to combat crime, and is taking insufficient action to address the crime ravaging Arab communities in Israel.

In the letter, Afek outlined recommendations set forth by the Attorney General's office, saying that these are "a series of steps that the Israeli government can and should advance, and we hope this will be done as





# Trump lauds Mamdani despite NYC mayor-elect's Israel criticism

WASHINGTON — New York City Mayor-elect Zohran Mamdani, holding his hotly anticipated first meeting with U.S. President Donald Trump at the White House, reiterated his highly scrutinized position that U.S. taxpayer funds should not aid Israeli violations of human rights.

The meeting, held weeks after the progressive democratic socialist's victory sent shock waves throughout the world, was much more positive in tone, punctuated by Trump's repeated praise of the incoming mayor - even amid right-wing reporters' attempts at manufacturing conflict between the two officials who have been highly critical of one another.

Trump, speaking alongside Mamdani at a news conference in the Oval Office, downplayed Mamdani's earlier suggestion that Netanyahu should be arrested if he visits New York, saying, "We didn't discuss" it and noted Mamdani "has views a little ... out there ... but who knows. We'll see what works. He's gonna change. We all change. I change a lot.'
