Congressman calls ICE Swamp Sweep 'occupation' of city

New Orleans Congressman Troy Carter said the deployment of ICE and U.S. Border Control agents and National Guard troops amounts to a federal "occupation" of the state's signature city.

Immigration agents are expected to fan out in New Orleans this week as part of what's being called "Swamp Sweep," while Gov. Jeff Landry said President Trump told him National Guard troops will expand their footprint as well.

"We welcome partnerships, but not occupation," Carter said in an interview with USA Today Network. "If the president wants to help Louisiana, there are ways to do it.

"He could send more funding to retain and train local police and sheriff's

deputies. This is a disaster waiting to happen."

Landry has said he welcomes immigration agents and more National Guard troops to New Orleans and other Louisiana cities like Baton Rouge and Shreveport, although its unclear when or if agents and soldiers will be deployed in those Louisiana cities.

"Thank you President @realDonald-Trump and @Sec_Noem for putting AMERICANS first," Landry said in a post on X. "We welcome the Swamp Sweep in Louisiana."

Last spring Louisiana Gov. Jeff Landry has issued an executive order directing state law enforcement agencies to assist in federal immigration operations and urging local police agencies to join the effort.

Carter said he is particularly concerned about the deployment of immigration agents who he said have too often detained U.S. citizens.

"More and more we see someone accosted only to find out they are citizens and have every right to be here," Carter said. "This isn't the America we know and love."

Carter also issued the following statement.

"What we are seeing unfold in our community is not public safety; it is a political stunt wrapped in badges, armored vehicles, and military uniforms," he said. "ICE teams, Border Patrol agents and now National Guard personnel are being deployed to Orleans, Jefferson, St. Bernard and St. Tammany Parishes with almost no notice, no transparency and no meaningful coordination with local officials.

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Johnson lights up Capitol Christmas

U.S. House Speaker Mike Johnson of Shreveport-Bossier lit the 2025 Capitol Christmas tree Tuesday that will shine every evening until Jan. 1.

Johnson was joined by the Nevada congressional delegation during a ceremony celebrating the 53-foot red fir harvested from the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest in Nevada.

It's the first time Nevada has provided the U.S. Capitol Christmas tree.

"I know for all of us, Christmastime is a season of light and hope and renewal," Johnson said during the ceremony. "This time invites us to pause and reflect on the many blessings that God has bestowed upon our lives and upon this great nation.

"And tonight offers one of those rare moments where we can gather together and take stock of all those blessings."

Entergy prepares to power data center

Entergy officially began construction on two natural gas electricity plants in Richland Parish that will help power Meta's massive artificial intelligence data center in Holly Ridge.

The two Richland Parish plants will begin generating 1,500 megawatts of electricity in 2028. A third Entergy plant to fuel Meta's power needs will be built in St. Charles Parish when the company secures its permits.

Entergy and Meta will cover the bulk of the cost of the \$5 billion investment in the two Richland Parish plants, the companies and Louisiana regulators said.

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
