GLTS awarded **\$1.3M for** training

ANDOVER — Greater Lawrence Technical School received \$1.3 million in funding as part of the Healey-Driscoll administration's efforts to expand career technical training opportunities.

The money was given as part of the Career and Technical Initiative Round 10 grant to expand training opportunities for adult learners seeking jobs in high-demand trade occupations. The administration awarded a total of \$24.2 million in CTI grants to 23 school districts to train individuals in high-demand occupations within the trades.

The CTI grant program, overseen by the Commonwealth Corporation, partners with Career and Technical Education schools to provide adult learners, especially unemployed and underemployed individuals from underserved populations and underrepresented

Farmers Market: More than just fruits, veggies

HAVERHILL — While it seems summer is rapidly coming to an end, the Farmers Market at 10 Church St. will continue through October.

While the market was founded in 1978 by Wally and Stephanie Lesiczka, who own Wally's Vegetables in Haverhill, it is now run by husband-and-wife team Jeff Grassie and Lisa Marzilli.

Grassie is the modern-day manager of the farmers market, alongside his partner with help from Team Haverhill, a local volunteer action group that stepped in to assist the Lesiczkas.

What began as a small, relatively unknown shopping spot has blossomed into a weekend get-together with a rotation of about 50
