NORTH ANDOVER — The Market Basket battle over governance has landed squarely in court with a mid-December trial date.

A Delaware judge will rule on the Market Basket board's Sept. 9 firing of company president and CEO Arthur T. Demoulas, aka Artie T., and his challenge of that action.

The board claims Demoulas has ruled in an autocratic manner and stonewalled their attempts to carry out oversight obligations.

Demoulas claims the board seeks to oust him on behalf of his three sisters - Frances, Glorianne and Caren - who are motivated not to advance the company's best interests, but to channel more of the company profits to them and their family members.

The Demoulas sisters collectively own
