SNAP benefits (self-reported or verified) and be a Salem resident with proof of residency such as a utility bill, drivers license, or state ID required.

Eligible residents can reserve a pickup time on Thursday, Nov. 6, from 5-7 p.m. and Saturday, Nov. 8, from 10-11 a.m. at the Salem YMCA at 1 Sewall St.

Eligible residents should call 781-990-7071 to check current gift card availability and reserve a pickup time with staff. Reservation calls made after 11 a.m. on Friday will not be eligible for gift card pickup that week. Residents must present a valid photo ID and DTA/EBT card at time of pickup.
