State Police seek charge against Brockton mayor

BROCKTON — A clerk-magistrate will decide if there's enough evidence to charge Mayor Moises Rodrigues with assault and battery, the Plymouth County District Attorney's Office confirmed.

In a Tuesday, July 7 email, a spokesperson for the DA said that State Police assigned to his office "filed an application in Brockton District Court for a clerk's hearing to be held on a criminal complaint of one charge of Assault and Battery against Moises Rodrigues. We await the scheduling of that hearing."

The Mayor's Office had no immediate comment on the development.

The clerk's hearing is not an arraignment. It's sometimes called a "show-cause hearing." If the clerk-magistrate decides there isn't enough evidence to charge the person, such hearings usually remain secret.

Online court records searched Tuesday did not show any charges against the mayor.

What is the Brockton mayor accused of?

The DA's office did not specify what alleged incident the possible criminal charge stems from.

But the mayor was recently in court over a restraining order relating to an encounter with a trombonist from the Brockton High School marching band during the annual Huntington Day Parade. The 17-year-old student, now graduated, said in court that Rodrigues approached her toward the end of the parade and put his left hand around her waist. A judge found that he also touched her shoulders.

The incident left the student shaken. She and her family sought and won a harassment prevention order against the mayor. As is the normal

When the U.S. Supreme Court ruled the Trump Administration can roll back deportation protections for Haitians, it became even harder for Francesca Odne's family to bring her cousins to the United States.

and grandmother died. Odne's mother has been trying to bring them to the U.S., so she can take care of them, she said.

Hearing the news of the June 25 court ruling "broke our hearts," said Odne, who grew up in Brockton and is now a rising junior in college.

"It's just another day of trying to protect our own," she said.

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New charges for ex-Plymouth camp counselor accused of child sex abuse

An East Bridgewater man awaiting trial on charges he sexually abused a 7-year-old camper at the Plymouth Boys & Girls Club has been arrested again for possessing and distributing child sexual abuse material, police said.

Bradley A. Collins, 21, was taken into custody Tuesday and charged with two counts of possession of child pornogra-

phy and one count of distribution of material depicting a child in a sexual act, court records show.

Collins was arraigned on the new charges Tuesday afternoon, July 7, in Brockton District Court, where he was ordered held on a \$25,000 cash bail, court records show. A judge also revoked Collins' bail in his open Superior Court case, effectively ordering him back into police custody.

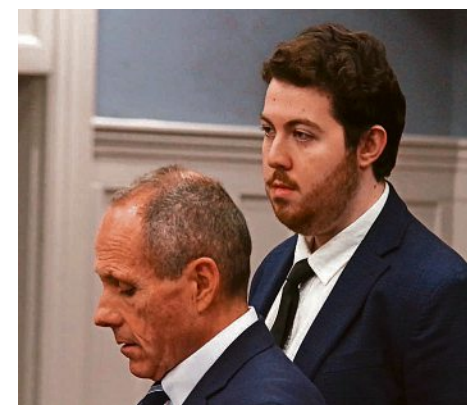
"Cases involving the exploitation of children are among the most disturbing
