Mayor defends affordability amid tax hike


Mayor Joshua Garcia says the city remains affordable, even as property taxes are set to rise by an average of \$352.

No movement on yearslong Westfield data center project

Local officials spent years arranging for significant tax breaks

When in May 2021 a group of developers approached the city of Westfield with a big plan for a big data center, an early release of OpenAI's GPT3 — a precursor to what became ChatGPT - was still six months away from opening to software developers for testing.

Now five years later, AI companies' demand for computing power and electricity has exploded. An August report from consulting firm McKinsey found that "to deliver the required data center infrastructure,

the United States alone will need to more than triple its annual power capacity over the next five years."

Amid that AI-infrastructure boom, Servistar Realties' proposal to build a "state-of-the-art hyper-scale data center campus" in Westfield seems practically clairvoyant. Last November, The Boston Globe mused about which tech giant would set up shop at the new facility: "Will it be Ama-

zon, Alphabet, or maybe Microsoft?'

To call it the largest data center in Massachusetts would have been an understatement. At the estimated loads, it would draw 10 times more power than the existing largest data center in the state — a 30-megawatt facility in the heart of Boston's financial district owned by the Markley Group.

From aisles to the ballot box

Mass. grocery prices explain what's at stake in '26 midterms

There's comparison shopping, and then there's comparison shopping.

In 2024, U.S. Sen. Elizabeth Warren, D-Mass., and other Bay State lawmakers called on regional grocery titan Stop & Shop to lower its prices.

The campaign came after a group of volunteers from the Hyde Square Task Force found that the chain charged shoppers at its Jamaica Plain store 18% more than it did at its outlet in Dedham, the lawmakers said.

The difference? Location, location, location.

The Jamaica Plain store mainly serves working-class and minority shoppers. The Dedham store serves shoppers in a wealthy Boston suburb that touches Interstates 93 and 95.

In August, Quincy-based Stop & Shop announced that it was

lowering prices on thousands of items in its 88 eastern Massachusetts stores as part of a broader initiative it started last year.
