Collins: Election appears key to ending shutdown

Maine's senior senator said waiting until after Tuesday is important to some Democrats, and that a public commitment by Republicans to vote on health care subsidies may be forthcoming.

White House will partially fund **SNAP** benefits after court rulings

PROVIDENCE, R.I. President Donald Trump's administration said Monday that it will partially fund SNAP after two judges issued rulings requiring the U.S. Department of Agriculture to keep the na-

tion's largest food aid program running.

The USDA, which oversees the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, had planned to freeze payments starting Nov. 1 because it said it could no longer keep funding


Also on this date: In 1922, the entrance to

FARMINGTON -County residents and people well beyond were shocked Friday when a photo showing Mount Blue Middle School Principal James Black in an ICE officer-inspired Halloween costume was shared online.

The photo of Black went viral over the weekend, showing him wearing what appears to be a tactical vest with a patch read-

Local residents and people from the far reaches of Maine and beyond have called for Black to step down as principal. Many Black dressed in the same outfit, have made calls and sent emails
