Maine oyster farmer's Senate bid makes national splash

A political newcomer and former Marine from Hancock County, 40-year-old Graham Platner joins a field of a half-dozen little-known Democrats hoping to unseat Republican Sen. Susan Collins in 2026.

It took less than 24 hours for Hancock County oyster farmer Graham Platner to go from political unknown to national progressive darling.

Since Platner announced Tuesday that he would challenge five-term incumbent Susan Collins for her U.S. Senate seat, his campaign has generated significant attention from national media and online influencers. Some

conservatives have already branded him "Maine's Mamdani," a reference to the New York City mayoral candidate Zohran Mamdani, who surprised many by winning a Democratic primary two months ago.

"This is far beyond anything I could have imagined," Platner said in an interview Thursday. "So many people have been reacting positively to a message of, frankly, things I've been saying to my

wife and friends for years." Platner, 40, is among a half dozen Democrats running to unseat Collins, none of whom is well known. But unlike the others, his campaign has racked up attention quickly. The New York Times, Politico, NBC News, MSNBC and Fox News all covered Platner's campaign launch Tuesday and the buzz about him on social media has been substantial.

Portland protesters object to ICE mandate in jetport grants

After the City Council met behind closed doors to discuss the arrangement Wednesday night, the mayor says the city may not be required to cooperate with immigration enforcement,

PORTLAND - City officials plan to sign a federal grant agreement that mandates cooperation with Immigrations and Customs Enforcement because the city's lawyers believe Portland will not be required to work with the agency,

Mayor Mark Dion said during

a news conference Thursday afternoon hours after protesters had gathered at City Hall to demand answers about the deci-

Dion said the grant agreement will be signed Friday, two days after the council called an emergency workshop to discuss new terms that tied the funding to cooperation with immigration

authorities.

At that meeting Wednesday night - which was held almost entirely out of public view -Dion said the council "reached a consensus" to move forward with accepting the grant for upgrades at the Portland International Jetport.

Appeals court tosses civil fraud penalty in Trump case

Upholding a finding that he fraudulently exaggerated his wealth for decades, the ruling spares the president from a potential halfbillion-dollar fine.

 $NEWYORK-A\,NewYork$ appeals court on Thursday threw out President Donald Trump's massive financial penalty while narrowly upholding a judge's finding that he engaged in fraud by exaggerating his wealth for decades. The ruling spares Trump from a potential half-billion-dollar fine but bans him and his two eldest sons from serving in corporate leadership for a few years.

Trump, in a social media post, claimed "total victory" in the case, which stemmed from a civil lawsuit brought by New York Attorney General Letitia James.

"I greatly respect the fact that the Court had the Courage to throw out this unlawful and disgraceful Decision that was hurting Business all throughout New York State," the Republican wrote.
