Holtec may request more regulatory relief for Palisades

Holtec International, owner of Palisades Nuclear Power Plant in Covert Township, is facing another regulatory hurdle that must be cleared before restarting operations.

Officials from Holtec and the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission held a pre-submittal meeting Feb. 9 to discuss a potential request for relief in light of missing documentation that "proves the safety of the metals used"

Park Township to buy Coast Guard Station for \$1.4M

Park Township hopes to complete a long-planned purchase of the former Holland Coast Guard Station by the end of February, according to a re-

lease.

The purchase was delayed following an extended federal government shutdown in 2025.

During a meeting in April 2025, trustees indicated the federal government previously set a price of \$1.47 million. Park Township agreed to sub-

mit a counteroffer of \$1.35 million, and an offer for \$1.4 million was verbally accepted.

Interim Township Manager Bill Cousins previously said a purchase agreement was submitted for review

Hotel in Holland faces risk control plan

Each week, the Ottawa County Department of Public Health releases a round-up of recent safety inspections at restaurants, schools and other facilities.

Adhering to proper safety practices is critical to preventing foodborne illness and promoting public health.

The Holland Sentinel publishes regular reports on "priority" violations — ones that could directly lead to contamination of food or increase the risk of transmitting a foodborne illness, as well as corrective measures taken.

The Sentinel also reports on "priority foundation" violations — ones that could lead to a priority violation. The health department notes "core" violations, but The Sentinel only reports on
