Area man sentenced in stabbing death BY DEBBY WOODIN

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A rural Seneca man has been sentenced to life in prison for the stabbing death of a Carl Junction man.

Scott Burleson, 32, pleaded guilty Monday in Jasper County Circuit Court in Joplin to a charge of second-degree murđer in a plea agreement. In Missouri, a life sentence for second-degree murder can range from 10 to 30 years before parole is granted, depending on factors that include the person's criminal record and behavior in prison.

The charge was filed in connection with the March 2, 2024, stabbing of Seth Langford, 36, at a house on State Line

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NEOSHO, Mo. — A nonpartisan orga-nization, VOTE417, is calling on Missouri Gov. Mike Kehoe to take action to fill vacant positions in the Missouri House of Representatives, including one in Southwest Missouri.

In District 160, which encompasses much of Newton County, including Neosho, the seat is open after Rep. Ben Baker resigned to accept appointment to lead Missouri operations of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Rural Development. A seat in District 95 has been open since late January when Rep. Michael O'Donnell, R-Oakville, resigned from the Missouri House after being sworn in to become the state's commissioner of securities. Angela Thomas, Democratic chairman in Newton County, had asked after
