# Driver in Carthage hit-and-run gets 4 years

Vehicle identified by debris left at scene where Domino's worker was struck

CARTHAGE, Mo. — A Joplin man involved in a hitand-run has been sentenced to four years in state prison

as part of a plea deal. Miguel Gaspar-Diaz, 43, was sentenced last Thursday to four years each for leaving the scene of an

accident and for tampering

with physical evidence in a felony prosecution. The sentences are set to run concurrently.

Charges of second-degree assault, DWI with serious physical injury and failure to drive on the right side of the road were dismissed.

According to a probable-cause affidavit filed by Carthage investigators,

police, fire and emergency medical services were called to the 1100 block of Baker Boulevard at 8:51 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 30, 2024, to an injury crash involving a juvenile male on a moped and an unknown second vehicle that had left the scene.

When they arrived, officers found the moped in the middle of the road but

no victim. A resident in the 1000 block of Baker Boulevard told officers that a male was lying in the ditch in front of their home and firefighters responded and started giving aid.

"Victim 1 was transported by EMS to Mercy Hospital in Joplin ... with extensive injuries including but not limited to a brain bleed,

torn aortic artery and multiple broken bones," the probable-cause affidavit stated."The victim was later transported to, and remains at, Mercy Hospital in Spring field...for critical care due to life-threatening injuries.'

The statement said officers found security video

## MOmentum Bike Park to open later this month

Joplin's MOmentum Bike Park opens to the public Monday, Nov. 24.

A ribbon-cutting is planned for 3:30 p.m. that day, and members of the

public are invited to come out and bring their bikes.

"We are pumped to open this incredible and unique park to Joplin and our surrounding communities," Paul Bloomberg, director of Joplin Parks and Recreation, said in a statement.

"People who may not have visited a bike park before will be amazed at the different features and trails that we've created. There's something for the little ones all the way up to the skilled bikers." According to the city,

when MOmentum Bike Park opens, it will be the largest municipal facility of its kind in Missouri, featuring more than 132,000 square feet of formal bike park elements alongside 10 miles of purpose-built mountain bike trails on 95

Bike park elements include two Velosolutions pump tracks, four progressive jump lines, a bicycle playground and traffic

garden, and a skills course. It also will include technical and flow gravity trails, traditional single-track, all-weather trails, climbing and circulation trails, as well as hiking trails.

### Missouri health premiums to rise

Increases could be as much 30% amid uncertainty over subsidies

Most individual health insurance plans sold in Missouri will increase in price next year even as customers prepare to dig deeper into their own funds to replace costs previously covered by federal tax credits.

The state Department of Commerce and Insurance on Friday released the approved rates for individual plans, most of which are sold on the health insurance marketplace. One carrier, Blue Cross Blue Shield of Kansas City, is lowering premiums an average of 4.1% for its plans available in 30 western Missouri counties. Some plans offered by the company will see an increase of as much as 9%.

for the other eight carriers offering plans in all or part of the state. Ambetter Health plans, available off the marketplace in 109 counties, will increase an average of 1.9%, while Cox Health Plans, available in five Southwest Missouri counties, will go up an average of 30.4%.

Premiums will increase

The costs for some Missourians will increase 70% or more if Congress does not extend tax credits enacted during the COVID-19 pan-

The federal government

has been shut down since Oct. 1 because congressional Democrats refuse to vote to fund the government until Republicans add an extension of the credits to the spending bill. Republicans argue the government should be reopened before negotiations over subsidies resume.

There are at least two companies offering health plans in every county, with a handful in the St. Louis area
